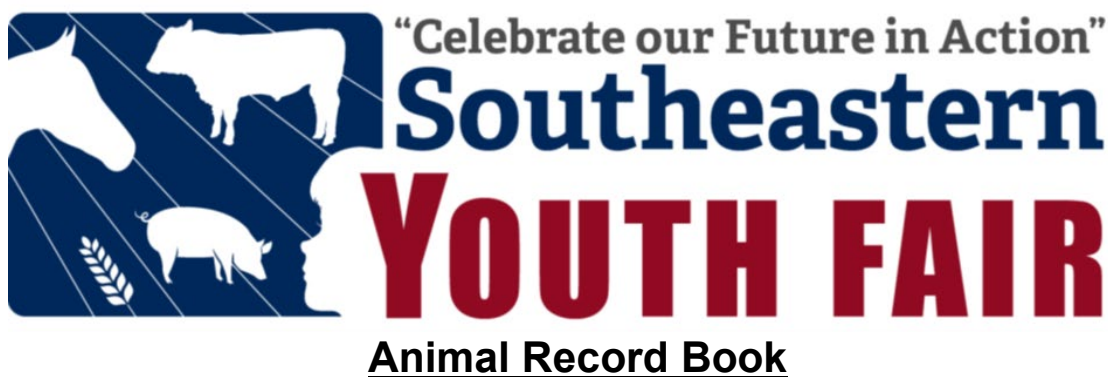

Youth Livestock Animal Record Book Guidelines

Notes from the judges:

1. Your Record Book should start on the show animal entry deadline date listed on the SEYF website.
2. Record Books should be completed on the animal relating to your current Youth **Animal Project**.
3. **DO NOT** take pages out of order/format.
4. Always double-check your work, especially your math calculations.
5. Have someone check your project story for spelling and grammar before you write it in the final record book.

Project Terms and Explanations:

1. **Project Inventory** – must include pen, feeder, and waterer. Other items may include are clippers, brush, show stick/whip, etc.
2. **Animal Inventory**- List the animals you are exhibiting at the start of your project and any purchased or born during your project. For example, suppose you are showing a beef heifer, and she had a calf during the project timeline. In that case, you will include the calf on the animal inventory page, including the birthdate, the value (market value or personal value), if you kept it or if it died, and the ending value (could increase or decrease)
3. **Date acquired** – **For Project Inventory: list the project year you obtained the item**. For all other sections, a full date of month/day/year
4. **Purchase cost** – What did this item cost you when you obtained it or fair market value? If donated, make a list of the items as donated and put a zero as the purchase cost.
5. **Depreciation**- This will be 10% of the original purchase cost for the items you will still have at the end of the project. This includes items you had at the beginning of the project and items purchased during the current project year. Depreciation is the loss in value of your assets and is an expense. Think of it as lost value because of being a “used” item that you can’t sell for the same “new” item price.
6. **Value of ending inventory**- This is the value at the beginning of the project minus the 10% depreciation for the current year.
7. **Profit/Loss of project**- This is determined by taking the potential income/value of your assets minus what you’ve spent on your project. If the amount is positive, it is considered a net income; if the value is a negative number, it would be a net loss.

PROJECT INVENTORY

An inventory is a record of all the items you use from your project, including the ones you already have when you start the project, the ones you buy this year, and things you will keep at the end of the project.

Remember grammar, spelling and neatness will be observed by the judges.

You can use the following statements to help you outline your story:

- ✓ Introduce yourself. Include why you joined 4-H and/or chose the project that you did.
- ✓ Tell about things you enjoyed learning or doing.
- ✓ Tell about the challenges you had.
- ✓ Explain how you would improve your project.
- ✓ Tell what you learned about yourself during this project.
- ✓ Explain how you could use the life and/or project skills you learned in other areas of your life.

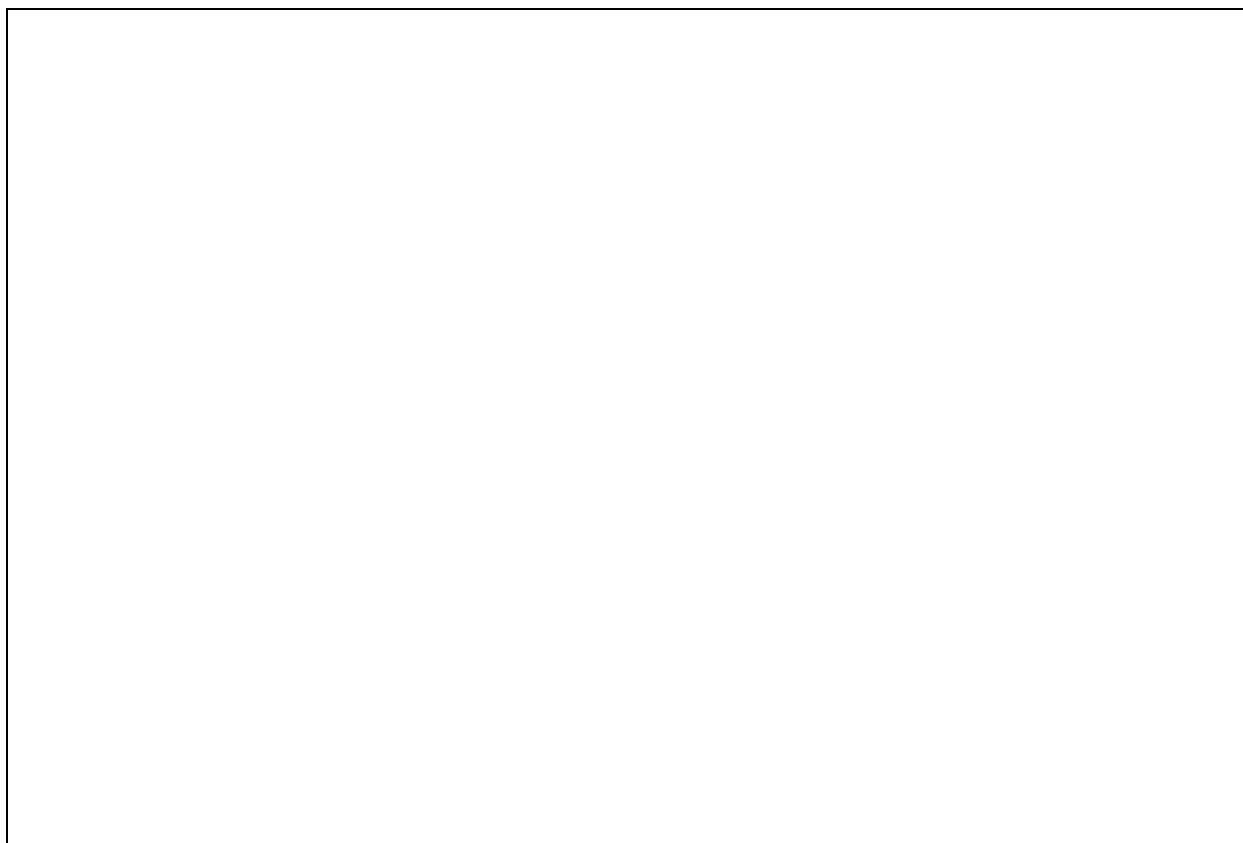

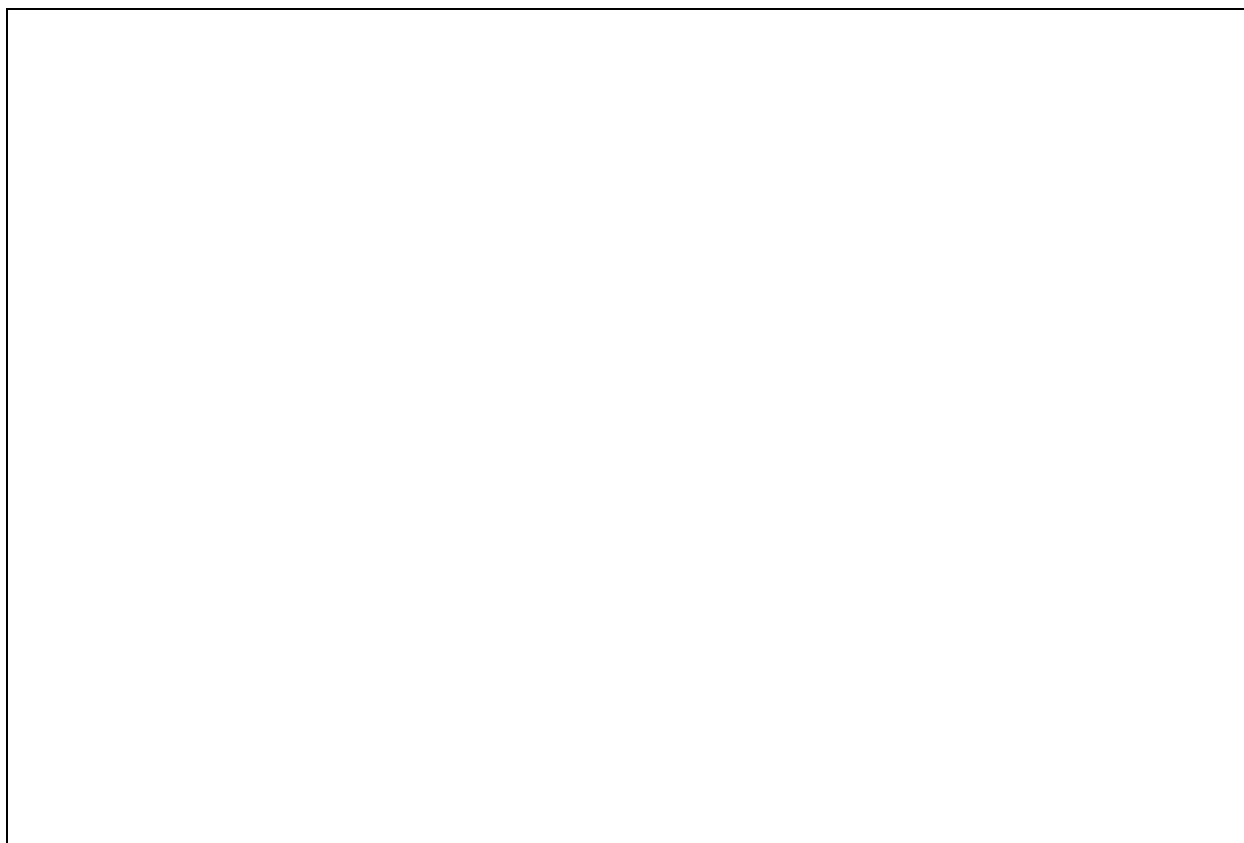
